# Noise Wall Update

We have recently heard from MOTI staff concerning the type of noise wall or barrier that might be installed along the edge of the Pat Bay Highway opposite Falaise Dr. They tell us there are difficult engineering challenges due to the steepness of the narrow embankment and narrow on-ramp. Your Directors will be meeting shortly with Saanich Mayor Murdock and MLA Lana Popham to review MOTI's initial proposal for a cement block barrier with a glare screen on top (see photo). At this time



it is uncertain what noise attenuation measures we will be able to secure or when such an installation might take place. We are optimistic that Mayor Murdock and MLA Lana Popham will continue to support our community and that we will receive a second proposal with an emphasis on noise attenuation. We appreciate all the support from our members as we continue to work for this community priority.


A special thank you to Trevor McCall for providing us with this spectacular venue and providing tea, coffee, water, dishes, and all the extras. Our community really came together!


## Registrar's Update, Spring 2023

#### Falaise Park Update

The playground continues to be a favourite spot for families in the neighbourhood. We saw many kids having fun on the toboggan run and playing in the winter snow. We are hoping Saanich Parks will be installing a second picnic table up by the memorial bench later this summer.

Lately, the Park seems to have become a "drop in" spot for larger birds of prey. A pair of bald eagles have been spotted perching on the tall Douglas fir trees this spring. Both a great horned owl and a red-tailed hawk have been noted flying low over the tree canopy and perching amongst the oak trees.

The snowdrop patches, although quite lovely when flowering in late winter, are spreading and are beginning to crowd out some of the camas

meadows. Our volunteers have been busy pulling out as many snowdrops as we can as they are classified as an invasive plant by Saanich and are not part of the native vegetation. The camas meadows are emerging from the winter cover of leaf mulch that we had spread. We look forward to a spectacular camas bloom starting late April.

Some of you may have noticed our new plantings in late winter. The caging is to protect them from deer browsing. Our efforts are now focussing on establishing flowering native shrubs such as Indian-plum, red-flowering currant and oceanspray. Recently, thanks to Saanich Parks, we were able to source and plant three healthy arbutus seedlings. Arbutus can be found growing naturally on the north side of the park.

#### Road Mural Update

It is now six months (August, 2022) since the stylised road mural was painted on a section of Falaise Cr., opposite the playground park entrance. The wear and tear on this painting is being monitored monthly. Although it is standing up well to the daily traffic it is beginning to show signs of wear. Most likely it will be repainted this summer, possibly in August. There is enough left over paint to do this as well as to touch up the children's decorative acorns.

Prior to the mural painting, we had a speed reader take data on the rates of speed

by the park. A second set of data was taken after the mural was finished to determine its success as a traffic calming strategy. The outcome will be written up in a report that is being prepared by Councillor Teale Phelps Bondaroff.
